ABOUT THE ARTISTS

Lauren Barchi (Mimi) is a second-year doctoral candidate in the studio of Eduardo Chama. Previously, she received her Artist Diploma from Rutgers where she performed the roles of Contessa (*Le nozze di Figaro*), Blanche (*Dialogues des Carmélites*), and Lady Billows (*Albert Herring*). She received her bachelor of music degree in vocal performance and music education from Ithaca College and her master of music degree in vocal performance and vocal pedagogy from NYU. In addition to performing, she is the assistant director at Professional Youth Theatre and is on the adjunct voice faculty at Long Island University.

Baritone **Stephen Barchi** (Marcello) is a New York native who has performed extensively in the United States and Germany. Last year he sang at Theater Aachen as Ludovic in *La Belle et la Bête* and as Dancaïro in *Carmen*. Previous credits include Nicholas in *Vanessa* with the Deutsches Symphonie-Orchester Berlin, Aeneas in *Dido and Aeneas* at Deutsche Oper Berlin, and Belcore in *Lelisir d'amore* at Oper Schloss Maxlrain. He was also a Flemish Deputy in *Don Carlo* at Oper Leipzig and appeared with Kammeroper Hamburg as Ali in *Adina* and Cascada in *Die lustige Witwe*. Barchi holds a BM from The Juilliard School and was a Resident Artist at the Academy of Vocal Arts in Philadelphia.

Manli Deng (Mimi) is an AD student with Eduardo Chama at Mason Gross School of the Arts. She was spotted by the opera conductor Louis Salemno, who invited her from China to the United States for further study as a young artist at Maryland Lyric Opera Institute. Her recent opera engagements include Huniu in *Rickshaw Boy*, Dama di Lady Macbeth in *Macbeth*, Helene in *Hin und Zurück*, Fiordiligi in *Così fan tutte*, and Belinda in *Dido and Aeneas*. Future credits include returning to Maryland Lyric Opera for her role debut as Gran Sacerdotessa in *Aida* in May 2023.

Baritone **Chris Fistonich** (Marcello), currently residing in Princeton, New Jersey, is a PhD Immunologist and cybersecurity researcher turned opera singer. Chris has been hailed as a "voluminous, beefy baritone" with "supple variation of dynamics" (South Florida Classical Review), and as a "strong baritone" (Schmopera). Future engagements include Baron Scarpia (*Tosca*) with Garden State Opera, and the title role in *Don Giovanni* with Aquilon Music Festival. Recent engagements include Escamillo (*Carmen*), Ben (*The Telephone*), Mr. Gobineau (*The Medium*), Count Danilo (*The Merry Widow*), Vodník (*Rusalka*), Peter (*Hänsel und Gretel*), and Pandolfe (*Cendrillon*).

Hailed as a "born storyteller", **Vincent Graña** (Colline) enchants audiences with his "mellifluous, smoothly produced" bass voice. Graña has performed across the country, including the stages of Opera San Jose, Teatro Nuovo, Dayton Opera, Opera Santa Barbara, Aspen Opera Center, and Pacific Opera Project. He is a second year DMA student under Eduardo Chama, in whose studio he earned his bachelor's and master's degrees. Recent engagements include singing Rafael

and Adam in Haydn's *The Creation* and Colline in *La bohème*, both with Dayton Opera. Last season, he sang Bottom in Opera Theater Rutgers' production of Britten's *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. Upcoming engagements include singing with the extra chorus in The Metropolitan Opera's new production of Wagner's *Lohengrin*.

Ziliang Hao (Colline) is a bass-baritone and a second-year doctoral student in voice performance at the Mason Gross School of the Arts at Rutgers University. He currently studies with Eduardo Chama. He obtained his master's degree in voice and opera at the Mannes School of Music and his bachelor's degree in acting and opera at the Central Academy of Drama in Beijing, China.

Yeawon Jun (Musetta), a full lyric coloratura soprano, was born in Seoul, South Korea and is now based in New York City. She has been seen as Mimi in *La bohème*, as Luigia in Donizetti's *Viva la mamma*, as Sophia in Massenet's *Werther*, and as Tytania in Britten's *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. She earned bachelor's and master's degrees at Yonsei University and studied under tenor Moolim Kang. She received a Professional Studies Diploma at the Mannes School of Music under Diana Soviero. Currently, she is pursuing a doctor of musical arts degree in voice performance at Rutgers University under Judith Nicosia.

Korea-born lyric tenor **Heejae Kim** (Rodolfo) has worked with the New York City Opera, Seoul Metropolitan Opera, Regina Opera, and Mannes Opera. With NYCO, he sang Don Ramiro in *La Cenerentola* at Bryant Park. Kim has also been heard as Edgardo (*Lucia di Lammermoor*), Nemorino (*L'elisir d'amore*), Rinuccio (*Gianni Schicchi*), Tito (*La clemenza di Tito*), Don Ottavio (*Don Giovanni*), Il Duca (*Rigoletto*), and (The Incredible) in *Andrea Chénier* in the USA and Korea. Kim has also sung the world premieres of several contemporary operas, including Jof in The Seventh Seal with Brazilian Opera and Brahms in Clara with its composer, Victoria Bond. He holds a BM from Seoul National University, an MM from Mannes School of Music, and a Certification of Opera Fellow from Boston University Opera Institute. He is now studying for a DMA at Rutgers with Eduardo Chama.

Michael Laporte is happy to be singing Parpignol with Opera Theater Rutgers. Earlier this winter, Laporte sang the role of Nemorino in Donizetti's *L'elisir d'amore* with Opera Magnifico, and last year he sang Lysander in *A Midsummer Night's Dream* with Opera Theater Rutgers. Coming up later this spring, he will sing Aeneas in Purcell's *Dido and Aeneas*, and cover Jaquino in *Fidelio* with Opera Company of Middlebury. He is pursuing a master of music degree studying with Dawn Kotoski-Shicoff.

Hayun Lee (Musetta) is a Korean soprano based in New York. Recent credits include Despina in *Cosi fan tutte* (Chicago Summer Opera), Ilia in *Idomeneo* (Mannes Opera, scenes concert), Susanna in *Le nozze di Figaro* (Mannes Opera, Da Ponte Project), and First Lady in *Die Zauberflöte* (Ewha Womans University).

Lee earned her bachelor's degree in voice at Ewha Womans University and a master's degree at Mannes School of Music in New York under Diana Soviero and Bryan Wagorn. Currently, she is pursuing her doctorate from Rutgers University under Dawn Kotoski-Shicoff. She is excited to be making her role debut with Opera Theater Rutgers.

Gabriel Lukijaniuk (Alcindoro/Sergeant) recently finished the voice performance program at Rutgers, where he studied under Eduardo Chama. At Rutgers, he sang with the Glee Club and Kirkpatrick Choir, where he was featured as a soloist in Haydn's *The Creation*. He also performed with Opera Theater Rutgers in their productions of Monteverdi's *L'Orfeo* (Pastore IV) and Benjamin Britten's *A Midsummer Night's Dream* (Snug). In 2017, Gabriel was selected to be in the high school honor choir at the ACDA National Conference in Minneapolis which was workshopped and conducted by Eric Whitacre. He is currently a member of the Philadelphia Symphonic Chorus led by Joe Miller and performs alongside the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Yannick Nézet-Séguin. In addition, he is the Baritone Emerging Young Artist at the Ars Musica Chorale based in Ridgewood.

Carl Muhler (Schaunard) is a bass-baritone currently pursuing a master's degree in voice performance at Mason Gross School of the Arts, studying with Eduardo Chama. He holds an undergraduate degree in voice performance from the same institution. This past summer, Carl sang the role of Papageno (*Die Zauberflöte*) at the Trentino Music Festival. With Opera Theater Rutgers, Carl has sung the roles of Peter Quince (*A Midsummer Night's Dream*), Plutone (*L'Orfeo*), Hermann (*Les contes d'Hoffmann*), and Amantio (*Gianni Schicchi*) in full, and has completed partial performances of Leporello (*Don Giovanni*), Bottom (*A Midsummer Night's Dream*), Figaro (*Le nozze di Figaro*), and Don Alfonso (*Cosí fan tutte*).

Andreas Psillos (Benoit) is a baritone currently studying under Eduardo Chama as an undergraduate at Mason Gross. He has previously played Peter in *Hänsel und Gretel* at the Trentino Music Festival. He is also a section leader at the Church of the Sacred Heart in South Plainsfield and a bass in the Rutgers Kirkpatrick Choir. He is currently preparing for his upcoming junior recital this coming spring.

Tenor **Siyuan Yin** (Rodolfo) is a first-year DMA candidate at Rutgers University under the tutelage of Dawn Kotoski-Shicoff. Previous credits include *Die Fledermaus* (Alfredo), *Alexander's Feast* (King Alexander), and *Le nozze di Figaro* (Basilio). He is also the tenor soloist in the Trinity Church.

ABOUT THE STAFF

Saffron Y. Chung (Principal Coach) was born in Seoul, Korea, and now resides in New York City. She chose her path in music early at Oberlin College, where she was the first recipient of a double major in piano performance and vocal accompanying. She also has a master of music degree in accompanying from the University of Cincinnati, College-Conservatory of Music. She has served as an assistant conductor of opera companies such as Chautauqua Opera, El Paso Opera, Florida Grand Opera, Glimmerglass Opera, Madison Opera, New York City Opera, Sarasota Opera, Syracuse Opera, Utah Festival Opera Company, and Wichita Grand Opera, under the batons of Harry Bicket, Richard Buckley, Christian Capocaccia, Barbara Day Turner, Victor DeRenzi, John DeMain, Raymond Harvey, Kynan Johns, Eugene Kohn, David Larsen, Robert Lyall, Stewart Robertson, Louis Salemno, Steven Sloane, Bob Tweten, and Steven White.

Chung has worked as a vocal coach and collaborative pianist, preparing hundreds of singers for auditions, concerts, opera performances, and recitals. Aside from the classical operatic and art song repertoire, she specializes in contemporary opera. Her recent international engagements include a tour with New York City Opera to Abu Dhabi and Dubai, where she was the music director for Bizet's *Carmen*.

Griffin also works as a draper and stitcher for Manhattan Theatre Club, Playwrights Horizons, LaGuardia High School and New York University. Ray Menard (Production Stage Manager) began his musical studies as a child on piano and clarinet and attended the New England Conservatory of Music before turning his interest to the stage. He received a BFA in theater from the Pratt Institute and joined the New York City Opera, where he spent nine years as Staff Director and Artistic Administrator. In 1987, he joined the Metropolitan Opera as Stage Manager and in 2010 became the Met's Production Stage manager, retiring from that position in 2022. He has served on the Board of Governors, as Treasurer, and is the current President of the American Guild of Musical Artists.

Menard is a devoted advocate for arts education as a music instructor and as adjunct Assistant Professor at the Columbia University School of the Arts. He has been a recipient of the Julius Rudel Award for excellence in Artistic Administration, and the Del Hughes Award for lifetime achievement in the art of Stage Management.

Joshua Rose (Scenic Designer) is an avid lover of opera as a member of the audience as much as a designer. This is his fourth production of *La bohème*. Other favorite operas to design include *Elixir of Love, Tales of Hoffmann, La Traviata, Madama Butterfly, Gianni Schicchi, Suor Angelica, Magic Flute, Hansel and Gretel*, and many more. Joshua designed both lighting and scenery for the December 2022 Opera Theater Rutgers production of *The Medium*. Thanks to Jim, Percy, and Isaac for their patience and support.

Benjamin Spierman (Stage Director) has seen his work critically acclaimed all over the USA. Opera Today praised his production of *Lucia di Lammermoor* for Opera San Jose as "riveting stuff." Other work has included *La bohème* for Syracuse Opera ("great visual appeal" – CNY Café Momus) and *Turandot* for Dayton Opera ("the most intimate, best-characterized production I've seen" – Dayton City Paper).

Spierman is general director at Bronx Opera, where he directed the NYC premières of Kirke Mechem's *The Rivals* and the Weber/Mahler posthumous collaboration, *Die drei Pintos*. He is also co-artistic director of Oswego Opera in upstate New York, where he has directed *Don Giovanni*, *H.M.S. Pinafore*, and a Trumped-up *Mikado*. Other work includes Verdi's *Falstaff* and Massenet's *Cendrillon* for Rutgers (winners of National Opera Association prizes). Recently, he led Bronx Opera's return to the stage (*La Clemenza di Tito*, performed in his own English version). In 2022, he directed three premieres: *Sacco and Vanzetti* (Marc Blitzstein, finished by Leonard Lehrman), Charles Abeles' *The Golden Cage* (written at Oswego's Fort Ontario Refugee Shelter during WWII), and Andrew Ager's *Dracula* (New Opera Lyra Ottawa, his international debut). Spierman holds a B.A. with honors from Lehman College. He is a native of The Bronx, where he lives with his wife, soprano Hannah Spierman.

Steven White (Conductor) was praised by Opera News as a conductor who "squeezes every drop of excitement and pathos from the score." One of America's premiere operatic and symphonic conductors, he made his acclaimed Metropolitan Opera debut in 2010, conducting performances of *La traviata* starring Angela Gheorghiu. Since then, he has conducted Metropolitan Opera performances with such stars as Placido Domingo, Natalie Dessay, Thomas Hampson, and Dmitri Hvorostovsky. With a vibrant operatic repertoire of over eighty titles, Maestro White's extensive engagements have included performances with New York City Opera, L'Opéra de Montréal, San Diego Opera, Utah Opera, Opera Colorado, Pittsburgh Opera, Michigan Opera Theater, Opera Omaha, Baltimore Opera, New Orleans Opera, and many others.

Some highlights of Maestro White's 2022-23 season include his debut with the Wexford Opera Festival in Ireland and return engagements at the Metropolitan Opera, Arizona Opera and Opera Omaha. As Artistic Director of Opera Roanoke, he will conduct Benjamin Britten's monumental *War Requiem* in a collaborative performance with the music department of Virginia Tech University.

Brandon Williams (Chorus Master) is an Associate Professor at Rutgers University, where he was the recipient of the 2020-21 Rutgers Provost's Award for Excellence in Teaching Innovations and the 2021-22 Rutgers Presidential Fellowship for Teaching Excellence Award. He also appears internationally as a guest conductor, clinician, and presenter. Dr. Williams has published articles in the Choral Journal and the Music Educators Journal, and he is editor of the book *Choral Reflections: Insights from American Choral Conductor-Teachers*. Dr. Williams also has several choral compositions and arrangements published with Hal Leonard, Colla Voce, and Morningstar Music Publishers. He holds degrees from Western Illinois University, the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, and Michigan State University, and an Artist Teacher Diploma from the Choral Music Experience–Institute for Choral Teacher Education.

Sarah Woods (Lighting Designer) (she/her) is a lighting designer for live performance and film. Recent credits include *Billy & The Situation* (Asylum NY), *Space Traders* and *Jimmy Naughton & Friends in Concert* (Williamstown Theatre Festival). She was assistant designer for *Living and Breathing* (Two River Theater) and *we are continuous* (Williamstown).
