PROGRAM NOTES

John Philip Sousa: The Black Horse Troop (1924)

The Black Horse Troop was completed on December 30, 1924, at Sousa's Sands Point, Long Island, estate. It was played for the first time about ten months later, on October 17, 1925, at a concert of the Sousa Band in the Public Auditorium, Cleveland, Ohio – and I was there. I had not been to such an event as this one; I remember that as Sousa's march was being played, Troop A rode the stage and stood behind the band to the tumultuous cheering. The March King enjoyed a long relationship with the men and horses of Cleveland's Ohio National Guard, known as Troop A.

Once again, his special comprehension of the thrilling spectacle of regimental movement produced a compelling musical experience for both the player and the listener, commanding our particular awareness of his use of the trumpets and drums at various dynamic levels. During the half-century of his career as the most successful bandmaster who ever lived, there was both reason and necessity for his creating these wonderful marches – and among them all, The Black Horse Troop is a positive standout.

William Harbinson: Evensong (2008)

Evensong is a beautiful ballad in standard song (ABA) form with a brief coda. The lyric nature of the composition offers opportunities to develop the ensemble's expressive playing with concentration on tone, intonation, balance, and phrasing. The contrasting B section features the woodwind voices and moves through several non-traditional key areas (B, D, C major) before returning to the tonic key (E-flat major) for a varied restatement of the A section. The coda provides a quiet and peaceful conclusion.

Jan Van Der Roost: Suite Provençale (1989)

Suite Provençale is a four-movement suite based on authentic folk tunes from the beautiful southern province of France, the "Provence." The composer used a harmonic language respecting the popular characteristics, but that, on the other hand, also contains some "spicy" notes (just like the well-known "Provençal sauce"! ...). The instrumentation is very colorful, paying a lot of attention to the different timbres of both brass and woodwinds as well as to the percussion section.

Every movement has its own character: *Un Ange a fa la crido* (An angel brought the creed/credo) is like a bourrée; *Adam e sa Coumpagnou* (Adam and his companion) is an old love song, *Lou Fustié* (the carpenter) a fast dance; and finally *Lis Escoubo* (a whistle tune / popular ballad) is a farandole. In the latter, the old tradition of folk musicians who play a whistle with one hand and a drum with the other hand is clearly represented during the first presentations of the one and only theme.

Gavin Lendt: Mesa Dances (2023)

Mesa Dances - The people of the Southwest and its beautiful and majestic landscapes serve as the inspiration for this energetic work. Motivic repetition, relentless percussion, and dramatic dynamic effects paint a picture of the desert mountains underneath a cerulean sky. With a keen sense of orchestration, this is an exciting piece.

Jacob de Haan: Ammerland (2001)

Ammerland - Gorgeous and enchanting, this warm and rich work will have the band reaching new heights of expression. The mid-voices introduce the exquisite melody, followed in turn by bolder scoring that invites the entire ensemble to create moments of broad intensity. Ammerland is a district in Lower Saxony, Germany. - Program Note from publisher

John Mackey: Lightning Field (2015)

Lightning Field takes its title from a work of art by Walter De Maria. That work is a massive expanse, 385 acres, of New Mexico desert, claimed and transformed by the artist via an installation of 400 steel rods: planted in the earth and reaching toward the sky, they call down its power -- literally creating man-made lightning storms. Like them, Mackey's piece speaks to the ancient impulse to summon nature's power, and the magic such acts unleash. A sense of energy runs throughout the work, with the driving onstage percussion enhanced by the sound of thunder (provided by inexpensive hand-held percussion instruments called "thunder tubes") surrounding the audience.

Joe Hisaishi: Theme from Howl's Moving Castle (2011)

Howl's Moving Castle is a 2004 Japanese animated fantasy film written and directed by Hayao Miyazaki. The film is loosely based on the 1986 novel of the same name by British author Diana Wynne Jones. The film was produced by Toshio Suzuki and animated by Studio Ghibli with a voice cast featuring Chieko Baisho and Takuya Kimura, while the English dub version starred Jean Simmons, Emily Mortimer, Lauren Bacall, Christian Bale, and Billy Crystal.

The story is set in a fictional kingdom where both magic and early 20th-century technology are prevalent against the backdrop of a war with another kingdom. The film tells the story of a young, content milliner named Sophie, who is turned into an old woman by a witch who enters her shop and curses her. She encounters a wizard named Howl and gets caught up in his resistance to fighting for the king. - Program Note from Wikipedia

Mr. Tkacik also holds a bachelor's degree in music education and is a summa cum laude graduate of East Carolina University in Greenville, NC.
